The contribution of university to the building of the european spirit

Throughout his history, European conscience has constantly been characterized as a culture of encounter, between a man and other men, between a people and other peoples: in fact Europe itself was born from the encounter between human beings and peoples carrying different cultures.


First, the encounter between Hellenic, Roman and Jewish culture (mediated by Christianity); then the encounter with the cultures of different peoples coming, in successive waves, from the east (the so-called barbarian peoples), the last of which were the Slaves (see the fundamental contribution of Cyril and Methodius); and finally, also the encounter, although many times dramatic, with the Arab and the North African world.

Europe has thus always been a crossroads of peoples and cultures, a space of freedom and encounter: for this reason, it has also been able to create places and structures that respond to the real, different needs of man and society: see the birth of universities and hospitals.

From the 12th century these different dimensions were fading until they disappeared, eventually resulting in the immense tragedies of the two World Wars.

However, after World War II, some politicians of good will decided to rebuild a new Europe that would recover its identity as a space for meeting and freedom for European men and nations.

The existence of Europe depends on the faithfulness to the ideals of the founding fathers, in order to create and guarantee that space of freedom in which we can meet the different answers of meaning.



The university has always been (even in dramatic historical times) and still is a place of freedom and encounter.

In this conference we would like to present experiences from some European universities, in dialogue with academics from different "areas" (north and south, east and west).

The starting point of the discussion will be the challenge posed by some questions we found in a leaflet released by the Communion and Liberation movement during the recent European elections, and that we would like to ask to the speakers, and to all partecipants as well:
